2013 Club Championship Regatta

The 2013 WCSC Club Championship Regatta will be held on April 27 and 28 this year. We are thankful to be sailing Flying Scots on loan to us from club members. Sailing Saturday in the Challenger Fleet are Steve Kiemele and John Kriedler...so far. As of our publishing deadline, we are still waiting on acceptance of other invitations for the Challenger Fleet. The winner on Saturday will advance to Sunday and participate in the Championship Fleet against Marc Bailey, Dick Harder and Dennis Baker. This should be an exciting event to spectate. Racing starts at 1000 both days.

Feel free to come down and enjoy some of the best racing to be seen at our club. Last year both days provided amazing spectating. The lake was just far enough down that we had a nice beach in front of the point and we had a nice little crowd of spectators. I was posting Facebook updates giving play by play detail of the races. Certainly the most fun I've had spectating sailboat racing, even better than the America's Cup on TV.

WCSC has received no new membership applications since the orientation of Greg Dimitrew who was introduced in the first windsong or 2013, so there are no new members to introduce this time around. It is not uncommon for applications to lag during the cold winter months, so having an opportunity instead to describe the plans of the membership committee has attracted my attention.

The committee members are A. G. Caldwell, Richard Curry, Jim Hudson, Margaret Kiemele, Curt Rubinstein, Jeri Zoerhoff, and me. We have been working under the loose assumption that WCSC could accommodate about 250 memberships. Our membership has hovered in the 235 – 245 range. However, two recent developments have caused us to consider adopting additional methods for attracting more applications. In most years, WCSC needs to attract twenty or so new members to replace those lost to attrition (job changes, loss of interest, children growing out of sailing, etc.) The first development is that this year's attrition has been unusually high and our membership has slipped to about 220. The second is that the Board thinks the club would be well served if the membership limit were increased over several years to about 270, giving the club time to evaluate whether those gradual increases will strain the capacity of our facilities. Given that the WCSC budget has rarely gone down, it gives us hooves (it behooves us) to think of new ways we can build our membership. The alternative down the road is an increase in dues and fees.

About 75% of us come from the Greenville and Anderson areas. Most of those whose association with the club lasts a long time had an interest in sailing before joining us. Most of our applications come from five sources: **guests whom members invite to the club** (I myself, having been sailing on Lake Norman for several years, learned of the club after visiting as Wayne Cheser's guest); Ron Moede's adult Learn to Sail course; West Marine customers who are alerted to the existence of the club by Paula and Art Rouse; folks who found the club website; newcomers who attend our annual Open House.

The committee has some concrete plans and some developing ones to try and spread awareness of the engaging characteristics of the club and its activities (i.e., market the club). Here is a list:

1. We will sponsor the Open House again this year, again on the Saturday of Memorial Day weekend. We'll need some Fair Share help as we have in the past. **Please watch for the e-mails describing "This Week at WCSC" as we get closer to the event.**
2. We have developed a short presentation supported by PowerPoint slides that Curt Rubinstein will give to local Chambers of Commerce and local Realtors associations. Thus, individuals likely to be contacted by newcomers to the area will know about us. This was initially Richard Curry's idea. Curt plans to follow up by getting one of our brochures to those in attendance and by inviting them to our Open House.
3. The Board has created a new "standard" e-mail address that interested parties can use to get information and arrange tours of the club: membership@wcsc-sailing.org. It's posted on the sign at the front gate and is linked to the "Membership" entry on the "Club Information" page on the website.
4. Margaret Kiemele has designed a business card with our contact information and a short list of our activities and resources. **If you'd like to have some of these, please let me know.**
5. Our old brochures are woefully out of date and even contain contact information that is no longer current. The committee is redesigning the brochure. **Have you any photos to share with us?** E-mail them to me at srmathews@att.net or membership@wcsc-sailing.org. The new brochure should be available by mid-year. Art and Paula Rouse at West Marine have made great use of the old ones to help us attract new members.
6. The Board has approved the suggestion of offering those who complete Ron Moede's course a complimentary, 90-day membership (without storage privileges). The idea behind this is that these folks, who have already demonstrated an interest in sailing, will be afforded an opportunity to experience the club and be in a better position to know which kind of boat attracts them. They may well decide to become full-fledged members rather than see their privileges at the club come to an end.
7. **The committee would like to encourage members to invite guests to the club, since many of our new members find out about us in that way. If someone you host joins the club, the committee would be pleased to purchase some small item for you (a burgee, a cap with the club logo) from the ship's store in recognition of your help.**
8. The committee would like to be able to send a one-time e-mail, calling attention to the club, to individuals in the Greenville/Anderson areas who have an interest in sailing. To that end, we are exploring getting the e-mail addresses of local subscribers to SAIL magazine. We filed a similar request with US Sailing and discovered that sharing such information is not consistent with their privacy policies. **If you have any suggestions regarding the generation of an e-mailing list for individuals already interested in sailing, they would be gratefully received.**
9. The committee is considering advertising the club in SOUTHWINDS magazine since it has local circulation.
10. If each club member occasionally takes the time to describe the features of the club when talking with friends and acquaintances, the goal of increasing our membership will probably be more easily achieved. The committee wishes to solicit your help in this endeavor.

Hope I haven't bored you to tears; but I thought you might be able to ease our path if you knew what we are planning. Thanks.

Four other things:

1. If you have any interest in joining our happy band on the membership committee, please don't be bashful.
2. If you have ideas about how we can improve our 'marketing' of the club, please share them.
3. Should you encounter or invite visitors, please note that application forms are available both on-line and in the small bracket on the lobby wall of the clubhouse (just on the right after entering the lobby from the parking lot).
4. Lastly, I am saddened to report the resignation of Mary Jane and Dan Elliot. They are long-time members of WCSC who have decided to move back north to be closer to their children. Mary Jane and Dan, you will be missed.



Camper Storage

Spring is upon us and the camper storage area is blooming. Some in good ways and a few ways that need attention. Over the winter we have picked up a few new faces. Most recently Tim Crane has picked up the Lapierre's camper, before that the Curtisses got Bill Darby's camper. As part of our camper storage expansion, BJ Leonard, the Pashkes and the Fandettis have brought their campers. They are in temp spots now but may have their permanent spots by the time this is published. If not, soon after they will have those spots. So welcome all these new faces when you see them.

Since spring is here, it is time for spring cleaning. In March, we'll go around and perform our quarterly inspection. I'm sure we'll find campers in need of washing. It doesn't take long for things to take root and start growing. A few minutes with a pressure washer and your camper will be looking ship shape again. If you can't get to the cleaning of the outside, let me know and I'll hook you up with cheap labor to get that taken care of for you. On a personal note, I know my camper was looking pretty dirty back in February. It'll probably be unsightly in March and I'll get it cleaned up the first warm Saturday in April. This is just an annual event with owning a camper I suppose.

About our expansion project, we are adding 5 new spots with 30amp service. We are able to do this by pre-funding 3 years of camper fees. The 5 new owners of these spots all ponied up 3 years of fees up front to cover the cost of our project. We are putting in a new 400amp service and the 30amp spots will have their own meter and own bill. The new spots will run \$100 more than the old 15amp spots. As you can see, we have room to expand or upgrade other spots in the future. Growing the available camper spots will help us attract members from a larger geographic area. I know that being in Atlanta, I spend a bunch more time at the club now than I did before I had a camper. The camper is probably the best thing I've ever bought for the club. It has greatly improved my enjoyment of this wonderful resource we have in WCSC. I wrote an article back in 2010 about spending "A week in the box". While the camper didn't attract me to WCSC, it certainly has kept me from joining another club closer to home.

Camper storage is a great community and it stays that way through your participation. Taking care of the mainland head, the swamp and other mainland facilities is a shared responsibility of the camper storage folks and the folks on A and B docks. We use the area and everything we do to make it better just plain benefits us. So, don't be shy to take care of issues as you see them. Downed limbs in the road or trash on the ground or even the simple stuff like no back up roll of TP. When you see it, take care of it. When we all do this, the club is great place to enjoy. If you aren't sure how to take care of an

issue, just let me know and I'll point you towards the resource to assist you in a solution. Over the winter we took down several trees and even rescued a camper from a fallen tree. It was a hard day of work. Thanks to those who participated. We still have a few more trees to drop. We'll let you know when that day is so you can come out and play Paul Bunyan with us. On those mainland workdays, we usually throw something on the grill at the Lodge for lunch. We just really have a great time working or playing at the club.

Can you believe we just celebrated the club's 50th Commissioning Day? Pretty cool!

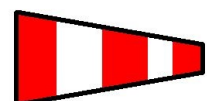

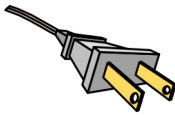

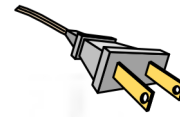

Safety News

Summer fun is quickly approaching and should not be marred by a major catastrophe. Last year a child received a severe electrical shock from swimming around a boat that was hooked up to shore power at a marina on this lake. These connections are designed to connect to shore power and work pretty good when they are new. These same connections over time and vibration can become defective with no visible signs. There are tests that can be done but a test that is good today does not guarantee the problem won't arise the next time you hook up. We do not provide power at the docks for that reason. If you need to power a device on your boat please do so with an extension cord and only when you are present. The club does not allow connection by shore power connections. Not worth the risk of losing one of our kids or members due to faulty connections.

2013 Junior Sail Camp

Beginning the first week of May, online registration will open at www.wcsc-sailing.org for this year's Junior Sail Camp offered by Western Carolina Sailing Club. Paying for junior Sail Camp is easy – you can pay online with a credit card or by bringing a check to registration during any of the "Session 1's" defined below. Registration paperwork will be available online beginning May 1, 2013 when registration opens and should be completed prior to attending the Session 1 you wish to attend. The required documentation for this year consists of:

- Registration
- Medical consent form
- Parental consent
- Waiver of Liability - This will be provided to you and reviewed during the Session 1 you and your junior attend.

Advanced Student Session 1 will be on the first day of their Advanced Sail Camp. Dates for Advanced classes are TBA. For juniors registering for the advanced classes, please register online and bring your completed paperwork on the first day of your class along with a check if you did not pay online with a credit card. Advance student registration must be completed online no later than the 15th of May.

2013 Junior Sail Camp will be held July 13 & 14 and July 20 & 21. Junior Sail Camp Registration (Session 1's) for Beginner's 1 & 2, Intermediate 1 & 2 and Team sailing classes will be held on the following dates at the times listed below. You are only required to attend one session at one time slot defined below.

Please arrive for Session 1 approximately 15 minutes prior to the start times listed above to complete the sign in/registration process. If your registration paperwork is not complete at that time, please note that we may ask you to step to the end of the line to complete it.

All juniors registering to participate in Beginner 1 & 2, Intermediate 1 & 2 and Team sailing classes for the 2013 Junior Sail Camp are **REQUIRED** to attend one of the "Session 1's" outlined above for Junior Sail Camp. A parent, grandparent or legal guardian of the junior being registered must also be present for the Session 1 that their junior is attending.

If for any reason you have a junior that cannot attend any of the specified Session 1's outlined above, please contact Johanna Curtiss by email at jkcurtiss@bellsouth.net to make alternative arrangements for you and your junior to attend a Session 1.

Session 1 will consist of the following:

- Orientation session along with a Q & A
- Swim test – (*tread water for 3 minutes and swim the length of our launch ramp*)
- Life jacket check (*must bring life jacket that will be used during camp*)
- Capsize drill

Failure to attend "Session 1" will result in your junior not being able to participate in this year's Junior Sail Camp. Advance registration is required and space may be limited so please register early!

On July 13, 2013, Sail Camp will begin at 9:00am. Sail Camp on July 14, July 20 & July 21 will begin at 10:00am. Sail Camp will end promptly each day at 3:00pm and there will be an ice cream social and awards ceremony at 3:30pm on Sunday, July 21st for juniors and their parents, guardians and family. RSVP for this event is required the 1st weekend of Sail Camp. There will be an RSVP signup sheet available in the morning on July 13 & July 14.

Western Carolina Sailing Club's Junior Sail Camp is open to anyone between the ages of 8 and 18 for both members and non-members. Within the camp there are 4 class opportunities based on prior participation and skill level. You will be asked to select one of the four classes on the registration form so please read the options carefully. If your child has previously attended, please register your child for the class to which they were last promoted. *(If your junior attended last year, they received a certificate that identifies that class).* If you are unsure of what class your child should attend, please email Johanna Curtiss at jkcurtiss@bellsouth.net.

- 1). **Beginning Sailing 1 & 2** - Students of any age may attend Beginning Sailing. This class teaches the basics of dinghy rigging, sailing, safety, wind, weather, knots, docking, starting, stopping etc. Students are required to attend this class for 2 or more years prior to advancing to any of the other classes offered with the exception of Team sailing. Class is from 10:00am – 3:00pm, each of the four days.
- 2). **Intermediate Sailing 1 & 2** – Students of any age that have attended Beginning Sailing and have been advanced by their instructor(s) into Intermediate. Beginning in 2012, there were certificates of advancement provided to each student advancing into a new level. If your student has attended the WCSC Junior Sail Program in Beginning Sailing for 2 or more years, it can be assumed that your child will be qualified to advance to Intermediate Sailing this year and therefore, you should register your junior for this class. The intermediate class instruction will include but is not limited to the following; rigging, sail trim, wind reading, basic rules of the road, beginning racing, tactics, etc. Class is from 10:00am – 3:00pm, each of the four days.
- 3). **Team Sailing** - This class is for beginner students wanting hands on learning opportunity with instructors on the boat. The class is a condensed course covering basics and some intermediate with a great deal of instruction taking place in a classroom setting on a keelboat. This is a special class offering students a chance to also learn a little bit about working as a team as they learn how to captain and crew a Colgate 26 or similar keelboat. Class is from 10:00am to 3:00pm each of the four days. Limited space is available.
- 4). **Advanced Sailing** – Students that have attended intermediate sailing for 2 or more years, have been advanced into this class by their instructor or have passed the sailing test to advance into this class by the instructor(s) that run this class. This class focuses heavily on racing and tactics. The Advanced Sailing classes will run at a different time than Sail Camp and throughout the summer. The dates are TBA.

Advanced students are asked to please show up on their first day with a sack lunch, snacks, plenty of water and their life jacket. If you believe that your junior should be participating in this class or you intend to register your junior for the advanced class, please contact Joe Martin via email at joemartin1559@gmail.com. Please make sure that your registration information includes the best form of communication to contact you and an email address.

Further information regarding Advanced Sailing Class dates will be posted on the WCSC Club calendar online at www.wcsc-sailing.org as well as communicated by Joe Martin to those that have registered or expressed interest in registering for the Advanced Class.

The per-student fee for the four day program is \$60 for club members & \$195 for non-members. This fee includes:

- 5 days of instruction
- 4 lunches *(for beginners, intermediate & team)*
- 4 snacks *(for beginner, intermediate & team)*
- Sail Camp T-shirt *(for all students)*

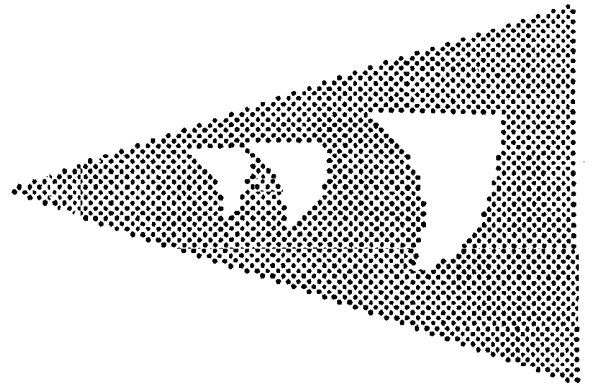
